## No net fill for Occidental Road bridge project 88-125

The "no net fill" policy proposed for the Laguna de Santa Rosa has not been adopted by any of the governmental agencies that have jurisdiction in that basin, but it will be a feature of the next major construction project scheduled to take place in the Laguna.

A no-net-fill policy has had the support of environmentalists who say it prevents the destruction of wetlands, and the dangerous displacement of flood waters.

The county's reconstruction of the Occidental Road bridge across the Laguna channel next summer will require approximately 60,000 cubic yards of fill dirt to support the approaches to the new bridge, which will be both higher and wider than the existing span. That dirt will be taken from a "borrow site" just a few hundred yards northeast of the east end of the bridge, excavated from a knoll on a 10-acre parcel owned by the city of Santa Rosa.

"Some of it will be used immediately adjacent to the site and some of it will have to be transported across the bridge to the other side of the Laguna," said Tim Mayer, the environmental specialist for the County Public Works Department.

A public comment period on the proposal ended last week with little reaction, Mayer said. The no net fill concept was introduced during the earlier environmental review of the bridge project, but the proposed borrow site had not been identified at that time.

The Sebastopol City Council endorsed the

## Top cops want more info on review board

Sonoma County's top law enforcement officials said this week they are taking a wait-and-see attitude toward a recent demand by libertarians calling for increased citizen review of police activities.

"It doesn't really mean anything until we can define what it's to consist of," said Santa Rosa Police Chief Sal Rosano. "It could be very beneficial if there is civilian review of police activities and practices. I don't have any complete opposition to the proposal."

The proposal is in the form of a letter to the county chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union to the Board of Supervisors last week telling the board that the ACLU would support any formation of a pending drug enforcement and "urged rejection of the new police countywide undercover narcotics squad unless civilian review boards are established on all of the county's police squads." Citing past police power and the inability of winning a redress, ACLU Chairman Steve Fabian said he got a vivid picture of what can occur when police chiefs and Sheriff fail to properly control their undercover squads.

As yet, the Board of Supervisors has taken no action on Fabian's letter. Supervisor Ernie Carpenter says he personally sees little value in a citizens review board but that any formal response would need to come from Chairman Herberson, who was unavailable for comment.

Sheriff Dick Michaelsen said that the "certain things were taken out of context" in the ACLU letter, he had already met with Fabian and planned to have more detailed discussions starting next week.

"I have no problem with a review board involving civilian and police members if it acts within its advisory capacity," Michaelsen said. "I want to cooperate."
