Sonoma Land Trust: Big Changes

Sonoma Land Trust has just moved to a new office at 534 B St. in Santa Rosa. Their new phone number is 526-6930. Dan Schurman is serving as the new full time executive director. He was chosen from over 50 applicants because of his extensive non-profit association experience.

The Land Trust has permanently protected 4500 acres in Sonoma County over the past ten years through acquisition of lands and conservation easements. Dr. Martin Griffin recently gave SLT an easement creating wildlife habitat and open space along a half mile of the Russian River near Healdsburg to help restore the riparian corridor and reestablish the steelhead and salmon fishery. Dr. Griffin, owner of Hopkiln Winery, is spearheading a new organization, Westside Wineries Association, whose purpose is to save valuable farmland and protect the underground aquifer along the middle reach of the river.

California State Coastal Conservancy in January approved SLT's Sonoma Baylands enhancement plan and funds to acquire 830 acres stretching from Port Sonoma-Marin at the mouth of the Petaluma River to Lakeville Rd. Most of the land, which covers a mile of bayfront and Hwy. 37 frontage, will be returned to tidal or seasonal wetlands, with 200 acres remaining in agriculture. Other benefits will include public access as part of the San Franisco Bay Trail, restoration of habitat for rare and endangered species, more coastal wetlands for migratory shorebirds of the Pacific Flyway, and a buffer for
